STUDIES IN RENAISSANCE LITERATURE Shakespear with his Contemporaries (1.5 units)

Newsstoriesseem to assume the general public will be surprised when a scholar says a play we think of as "by Shakespeare" shows einfluence of other writers. (For example, The Guardian announced "Christopher Marlowe credited as one of Shakespeare converters" when the New Oxford Shakespeare identified as sages likely written by Christophe Marlowe in the Henry VI plays) But Shakespeare scholar ave long recognized that some of what we call Shakespeare slays are co-authored, several earmarks of writing or 2001 in TwT of 150 parts.

Puttinginto conversation with one another texts that influenced Shakespeare and lose that were influenced by him makespossible not just critical analysis of Shakespeare is lay sbut also rethinking of literary history, theatre history, performant be ory, and editorial traditions.

Old and new historical as well as textual studies methodologies will guide much of the discussion in this course, but students will be strongly encourage to bring their own interests and perspectives to be aron their final seminar paper projects

 - o ThomasHeywood, EdwardV, Parts 1 and 2
 - ChristopherMarlowe, EdwardII
 - William ShakespeareRichard II and Henry IV

Note that students are strongly encourage to read (or reread) the plays by Shakespeare underlined above prepare for this course. Critical and contextual readings will be provided largely through introductions in carefully selected ditions but also through links to select articles and book chapters.
