



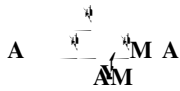

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## QT Prolonging Drugs-Alternatives

Below is a list of alternatives to some QT prolonging drugs. All patients with Long QT syndrome should speak to a health care provider or pharmacist prior to taking any new over-the-counter or prescription drug.
