COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

An introduction to advanced research designs and their underlying rationale. Extensive treatments are applied to the use of the general linear model. This class will be more of an exploration of statistics as opposed to formula memorization. Because I believe that learning and teaching is a bi-directional process between student and instructor, I anticipate that we will both prepare for each class.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK

There is no required textbook for this class. I will make all slides available prior to lectures, as well as readings. I want this class to be an exploration of statistics and what it means to actually conduct statistics. Therefore, we will be reading some original papers to see what was actually meant (and perhaps compare that to recent interpretations).

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENT

If possible, <u>it would be good to bring a laptop to class</u> as we will be analyzing data. I will be using *R* and Microsoft Excel in the class. All of these programs are free (as a UVic student you have access to Excel for free). This is not necessary, however. But... at the very least, you should have a calculator.

PREREQUISITES AND REGISTRATION

The prerequisites for ! 400A include:

- 1. A minimum grade of 80% in both PSYC 300A and PSYC 300B.
- 2. Concurrent registration in PSYC 499.

TOPICS COVERED

Visual & numerical description of univariate & bivariate data, including correlation and regression; probability theory as it relates to inferential analysis; hypothesis testing; application of -test and *t*-tests to single sample designs; communication of statistical findings. Examines designs having multiple independent variables and a single dependent variable. Topics covered include correlation, multiple regression, analysis of variance and Sampling.

GENERAL FORMAT

Course material will be presented in 4 sections through (potential) e-pub readings, lectures, graded labs, and homework assignments. Please try to keep up with each topic.
