What is this course about?– As social animals, we are all influenced by situations and the people we interact with. Social psychology explores the theories and empirical studies of how social contexts influence our thinking, feeling, and behaving. Topics include prejudice, stereotyping, attraction, attitudes, the self, prosocial behavior, persuasion, and others. The textbook is broad and general, while the lectures will cover more specific issues, especially recent experimental and applied approaches.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Become familiar with the range of topics that comprise the area of Social Psychology.
2. Explain the strengths and limitations of the methods of investigation used in Social Psychology.
3. Develop the ability to relate the findings of Social Psychology research to their own lives and to important issues in society and the world at large.
4. Critically think about issues related to Social Psychology and the reporting of psychological research in the media.

Course prerequisites: The prerequisites for this course are PSYC 100A & 100B. Students who remain in courses for which they do not have the prerequisites do so at their own risk. Students who complete courses without prerequisites ARE NOT exempt from having to complete the prerequisite course(s) if such courses are required for the degree program.
