In 1994, the President's ad hoc Committee on International Activities suggested a set of guidelines to apply to activities conducted outside Canada these were subsequently approved by Senate. Drawing from these guidelines, and adding other items which have surfaced in discussions and through experience since, the following is an attempt to define the critical issues underlying a decision to approve or not approve an international project or program.

The activity should:

2.1 Assist in the transfer of knowledge which will be used

- 5.3 Be undertaken on a break-even or profit basis, or be underwritten by a cross-subsidy from another international initiative.
- 5.4 Provide the opportunity to make contacts that will assist in University fundraising.
- 5.5 In the case of revenue generation projects, include a provision that net revenues be channelled into University non-recurring rather than base funds for revenue sharing within the University.
- 5.6 In the case of revenue-generation projects, include a provision for revenue sharing within the University to be determined in advance.
- 5.7 In the case of projects that yield tuition revenue, include a provision that a proportion of the revenues be allocated to student bursaries.
